#### "The Dutch Architectural Influence at the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead", Christopher Pickell

In 1741 Dutch homesteader Thomas Bouman erected the building now known as the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead. But just how typical is the building of Dutch architectural design? Find out on **Friday, August 24**, from architecture historian Christopher Pickell, who will deliver a talk on Dutch design, and lead a tour inside and outside of the buildings. Mr. Pickell has been involved in historic preservation and restoration projects in Hunterdon and Mercer counties. He heads up the Flemington firm of Pickell Architecture, lauded for its work in adaptive reuse projects.
